





Just Rec'd your Xmas package of "Hersheys" and very glad to get them. Thanks ever so much old boy. I appreciate the gift more than I can tell you. It's the only Xmas package rec'd so far so guess the rest must have sunk.

Had a fair Xmas dinner nothing like home but still it was good. Was on duty Xmas, eve, and Xmas afternoon. Dinner was only thing to remind me of it, but still I am thankful I can still write.

A fellow doesn't realize what friends mean and who they are but believe me, you sure have done your share and I appreciate it old boy.

George and Royal are also, Ok. Very cold here. Unless something happens don't expect to be home for 1 yr. yet anyway. I only wish I had finished my year out at school, but then, I wouldn't have been here if I had. Well must quit. Give best to all and send regards to your folks.

SERGT. HERBERT A. CARR

Writes a Letter to His Father, H. H. Carr, of Mt. Tabor.

> St. NAZAUR, FRANCE, November 24, 1918.

MY DEAR FATHER:

This, the 24th day of November, 1918, is set uside by the members of the "A. E. F." through the "Stars and Stripes" to write their fathers a Xmas letter. A Xmas cheer; one that will not wear off.

Christmas, the most hallowed day of the year, always brings glad tidings for each and every one of us. Father means more to a person than any one else can ever imagine, who has not been away where it was impossible to see any one you know. This is my escond Xmas away from home without seeing any one I ever knew before. This time has flown for me and hope that it has with you. However, this is the last one that I will be away from the threshold of home and loved ones.

The reverence of father, the love of mother are the two factors that hold a man to character and true Christian manhood.

The world's a stage and each must play his part. We are here in France we have helped kill kultur and raise civilization to a higher plane. This could only be accomplished through the training of father and mother behind. We knew they were behind us; we knew we were here to defend them. I We have. We have brought security to our land, peace to the world and joy to all Christianity.

Father, let's cheer up. Let's have a Merry Xmas. I am not there in person, but will be in spirit. Clean the platter for me. Let's all go 'round and have a jolly good time, one that we can never forget.

A Xmas to be remembered, all together, but Herb, he in France. Come one and all. A merry Xmas and happy, prosperous New Year.

"FATHER"

Through valiant years he worked and saved and planned,

To give his boy the opportunities

And when the war came, Father laid his hopes aside, And helped his son to train up and

"My boy writes me from France," his graphic flet

Brought firmly down. None guess his suxious beart,

So well be plays, with amiles and jokes, his part, Mrs. Arreva Cuil, of Middleburg, has received the following interesting letter from her son:

Imperial Hotel, Blackpool, Eng. December 13, 1917.

Dear Mother .-

I am stationed at the above hotel for the present, have been here for a week now. We are waiting orders to go to France and in the meantime are drilling about five hours each day, in order to learn something about military discipline. I don't mind the work at all, in fact I rather like it. There are sixteen American doctors in 'he crowd here, representing about that many different states in the U. S.

Blackpool is a very nice city, it being England's summer resort, very much like our Atlantic City in America, and is therefore well supplied with fine hotels of which the one we are in is one of the largest and best. I expect that by the time this reaches you Christmas will be here or past, but any way I am wishing you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. I hope this finds you all well and that everything is going along nicely.

We have no complaints to make, are enjoying the work so far very much, even though we expect to suffer some hardships when we get to France. The true American spirit is to go through with it bravely and with a determination to win out in the end.

LETTER FROM JOHN SHAFFER

Tells of What Is Going On at Camp Sheridan—Boys Had a Happy Christmas.

> CAMP SHERIDAN, ALA., Saturday, Dec. 29, 1918.

FRIEND DON:

As I am on the sick list and the first chance I had to write for several days, I will send my thanks for the presents you sent me, and hope I may send you some in return scon, as there are so many different things here to send I do not know which you would be the most pleased with.

We are having a nice little winter all of our own now, and I think its almost as cold as up home.

Paul Snook and myself were through the State House yesterday, and there we saw many things of interest, one especially, a bedroom suite that Jefferson Davis used, and it was sure worth looking at as it was the oldest one I have ever seen. Also there were the old guns that General Lee used and also his old sword, a case of battle flags which were captured by the North and than returned by the War Department, and skeletons of negroes, and so many other things that it would take a Big Six tablet to tell you all about it.

I would like to tell you what we had for our Christmas dinner but it would be too much trouble, as I would have to look up the menu, and I think some one sent it home. I have so much candy, etc., that I will be a week or so getting rid of it. Every one in my tent received shout five or six packages, and they were all just like the one you and Jim sent me, and now we are planning how to sat all of it and not get sick before it spoils.

Christmas day it raised harder than ever before, and there were hundreds of people from Ohio here to see their sons. People were allowed to visit them in their tents and it was only allowed for that day.

We are going to have a shirt-tail parade up town New Year's day, and the Montgomery Advertiser (the leading newspaper) is also giving a program. I don't suppose you know what a shirt-tail parade is, so I will tell you. We all wear pajamas and have to march the same as when in formation. They are great, only it is a little cool for them just now.

Our Colonel went away and Major Williams now has charge of the regiment.

I was glad to hear that Ruel Williams arrived safely in France, and hope all the rest do.

I sent a picture of the artillery camp home, and if you will go down home they will show it to you. It is worth going to see as it is the only one we are allowed to send out of camp.

Well, I suppose you have about enough of this, so I will close and send my best to all,

I remain as ever,

The Logan County History Center has a small but distinctive collection of guns made by local gunsmiths including this Kentucky/Pennsylvania type long rifle made by S.W. (William) Hornback. Mr. Hornback was a gunsmith from Quincy, Ohio around the 1850s. The rifle belonged to John Shoots of Zanesfield.

We would like to thank Ray Quay of Sergeant's Gunsmithing in Huntsville. Mr. Quay donated much of his time and services in the restoration of this rifle. It was through this cleaning and restoration, and his own research, that Mr. Quay discovered that Hornback made the rifle and that he was from Quincy. Although the rifle has been in the museum's collection for many years, we did not know much about it other than that it



belonged to John Shoots. Mr. Quay's professional and detailed work has brought the historical significance of this rifle to light and in the process brought the rifle back to its original beauty.

Mr. Quay also restored our Moxley rifles that are on exhibit in the Underground Railroad Room and the Garner rifle in the Museum lobby. He has worked on several other guns in our collection as well.

Thank you to Ray Stamm for making the rifle display case.
